This progress is a testament to the dedication of our partners, community leaders, and everyone who has supported this initiative. 

ICRC operates five signature parks that offer a wide range of inclusive recreational opportunities for individuals of all ages and abilities—including programs for youth, teens, adults, seniors, and those with cognitive, physical, or emotional disabilities.

Throughout the year, these parks serve as hubs for community programs and special events. ICRC has earned regional recognition for the quality of its programs and facilities, drawing participation from beyond the agency's core service area. This broader engagement enhances the agency's financial sustainability, with user fees funding the majority of ICRC's operational budget.

# YOUR DOLLARS AT WORK



*To enhance services and expand facilities without increasing the burden on taxpayers, ICRC actively pursues external funding. In the past year, the agency secured grants from the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF), Parks and Recreation Development Fund (PARD), Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), the University of South Carolina, and Dominion Energy.*

*These funds help ICRC invest in park improvements and expanded amenities that benefit the entire community.*



# PARK & FACILITY IMPROVEMENTS

## Planning

- Successfully completed the ICRC Strategic Plan update.
- Contractor selected and construction underway for Phase I of Saluda Shoals Riverwalk.
- Design and permitting for Phase II of the Saluda Shoals Riverwalk is in progress.
- Secured a PARD Grant to support trail improvements at Mungo and Crooked Creek Parks.
- Phase I construction and bid documents for the Environmental Center are under review.
- Completed design and awarded contract for shade installation at Leo's Landing Playground.
- Evaluated and presented FY 2025–2026 Capital STB projects for approval.

## IT Upgrades

- Upgraded 25% of ICRC computer systems to support future technical growth.
- Implemented a district-wide keyless entry system.
- Expanded and upgraded ICRC security camera infrastructure at Saluda Shoals Park, Melvin Park, and Seven Oaks Park.
- Upgraded key IT infrastructure across the district to support future network capabilities.
- Implemented and programmed access control systems to support secure and managed access to court facilities at Melvin Park.
- Established internet connectivity at Saluda Shoals Park through IT infrastructure upgrades.

## Saluda Shoals Park

- Replaced all tables and chairs at the River Center and the Environmental Education Center.
- Completed roof repairs at the River Center and Environmental Education Center.
- Provided temporary power and rerouted electrical supply to support special events.
- Installed a new, climate-controlled gate house with restrooms on the park's east side.
- Expanded the kayak fleet to support growing program demand and rental needs.
- Coordinated installation and removal of displays for Holiday Lights on the River.
- Replaced existing roofs on six park shelters with metal roofs.
- Repainted exterior metal beams at the River Center entrance.
- Installed updated signage at kiosk throughout the park.
- Added benches along the disc golf course through an Eagle Scout project.
- Upgraded interior lighting in the River Center with energy-efficient LED fixtures.
- Purchased and installed a dual slide attraction for Holiday Lights on the River.
- Held a groundbreaking ceremony for the Saluda Shoals Riverwalk project.
- Removed all exhibits from the Environmental Education Center exhibit hall.
- Resurfaced the concrete flooring in the Exhibit Hall to enhance durability and appearance.

## Seven Oaks Park

- Cleaned and refinished floors throughout the building to improve appearance and safety.
- Upgraded lighting by replacing ballast with an energy-efficient LED system.
- Installed a control gate access system and perimeter fencing at Fields 5 and 6 to enhance security and field management.
- Repaired and replaced fencing at Fields 1–4 and added Soft Toss mats.
- Removed permanent pitching mounds and added portable mounds for field versatility.
- Added four sets of bleachers to the gymnasiums to accommodate growing spectator needs.
- Completed kitchen and bathroom remodel design in preparation for future renovations.
- Installed a commercial washer and dryer at towers 5 and 6 to support expanded operations.
- Refinished gym floors to ensure athlete safety and improve aesthetics.
- Upgraded Therapeutic Recreation rooms with new flooring, LED lighting, an automated door, fresh paint, custom storage solutions, and new furniture — funded by a donation from the Leo's Pride Foundation.

## Melvin Park

- Completed the Racquet Court expansion.
- Made drainage improvements at Soccer Fields.

## Crooked Creek Park

- Replaced wooden ballfield lighting poles on fields 1, 2, and 3.
- The Chapin Women's Club expanded the Butterfly Garden.

## Mungo Park

- Replaced the wheelchair lift at the Meech House.
- The Mungo Foundation enhanced the park entrance with new signage, landscaping, and the installation of "Rock Angels" artwork by Greg Fitzpatrick.
- Began the process of renovating the storage shed.





# 2024-25 HIGHLIGHTS



## Afterschool Programs

The Irmo Chapin Recreation Commission (ICRC) offered quality after-school programs to an average of *722 children per day*.

## Therapeutic Recreation

ICRC provides adaptive and inclusive recreation programs for children and adults with special needs. These programs focus on building life skills, fostering socio-emotional growth, and promoting self-confidence in a supportive environment. In 2024–2025, ICRC served an average of *21 participants weekly* through its TR afterschool program and welcomed *130 campers* to its inclusive summer camp. In addition, ICRC's adult TR programs had *1,680 participants* throughout the year. The agency received *\$60,000 in grant funding* to support district-wide after-school services and an *additional \$20,000* for the Palmetto Enrichment Program.

## Summer Camps

ICRC's Summer Safari day camps at Crooked Creek Park and Seven Oaks Park welcomed an average of *372 children per week* over a ten-week period. Extreme Safari, for youth ages 11–14, engaged *47 participants weekly*. A highlight of the summer included a collaborative mural project led by artist Alan Pearsall, which now enhances the Seven Oaks Park Community Center. In addition to these programs, ICRC *hosted 165 specialty camps*, offering a wide range of experiences tailored to children of all ages and interests.

## Children's Theatre

ICRC's Children's Theatre program hosted three live performances in 2024-25. A total of *118 children* participated in the program, performing to *2,035 audience members*.

## Health and Wellness

Health and wellness programs at Crooked Creek Park and Seven Oaks Park offer well-equipped fitness centers, a variety of classes, and indoor walking tracks.

## Senior Services

As the designated Council on Aging for the area, ICRC provides essential services to older adults through Crooked Creek Park and Seven Oaks Park. Offerings include Meals-on-Wheels, group dining, transportation assistance, and a variety of health and wellness programs designed to support independence and quality of life.

In the past year, ICRC served *22,462 meals* to local seniors. The community showed strong support for these efforts, contributing *\$27,755 to the Meals-on-Wheels program* through generous donations.

## Athletics

ICRC had *4,935 participants* in our youth and adult athletic leagues which included: lacrosse, softball, football, flag football, cheer, soccer, indoor soccer, cross country, track, baseball, basketball, and golf.

## Market Development Tournaments and Events

During FY 2024-2025, ICRC hosted *70 sports tourism events* headlined by the Columbia Volleyball Club the "Clash." Additional events included 5Ks, fun runs, baseball, softball, lacrosse, and flag football tournaments. These events brought *170,480 visitors* to ICRC facilities with an estimated *economic impact of \$4,735,578*.

## Environmental Education Programs

ICRC's Environmental Education Programs, aligned with national and South Carolina science standards, provide hands-on learning experiences for schools across the region. Held at Saluda Shoals Park, each program includes a brief instructional session, interaction with preserved plant and animal specimens, and a guided nature walk. In the past year, *5,767 students* participated in these engaging, curriculum-based programs designed to foster environmental awareness and stewardship.





## Environmental Stewardship

The Irmo Chapin Recreation Commission (ICRC) is committed to environmental stewardship across the district. Our parks actively recycle paper, plastic, and aluminum waste to reduce our ecological footprint. At Saluda Shoals Park, the health of the Lower Saluda River is carefully monitored through regular water quality testing conducted by the Midlands River Coalition. Additionally, AECOM performs groundwater testing before it reaches the river, ensuring the continued safety and integrity of this important natural resource. Supporting the local ecosystem, the South Carolina Department of Natural Resources (SCDNR) enhances aquatic life by regularly stocking trout in the Lower Saluda River at Saluda Shoals Park.

## Special Events

ICRC offers a variety of special events each year, which attracted *360,000 people* to our parks. Events include: athletic tournaments, Backyard Saturday, Bowl Day, Candy Cane Hunt, Chairman's Lighting Ceremony, Cooking with Santa, Corks & Kayaks, cross country and track meets, Daddy Daughter Dance, EGG-cessible Egg Hunt, Enchanted Fairy Trail, fall and spring craft markets, Farmer's Market, Flashlight Egg Hunt, Indoor Yard Sales, Halloween at the Park, Halloween at Saluda Shoals Park, Holiday Lights on the River, Holiday Market, Howl-O-Ween at the Bark, Opening Day, Outdoor Movie Night, Paddle and Pint, Parent's Night Out, Pickin' & Piggin' BBQ Cookoff, Pimento Cheese Festival, Pre-school and Special Friends Egg Hunt, Saluda Shoals Egg Hunt, Saluda Shoals Jazz Series, Santa's Market Craft Show, Shuckin' on the Shoals, Sleigh Bell Trot and Stroll, Slip, Slide & Splash, Soggy Doggy Day, Touch-a-Truck, and Winter Wine.

## Meetings and Rentals

ICRC provides a variety of indoor and outdoor venues ideal for both business and social gatherings. Facilities at Crooked Creek Park, Melvin Park, Saluda Shoals Park, and Seven Oaks Park include picnic shelters, athletic fields, and meeting rooms suited for events of all sizes. For larger functions such as weddings, conferences, and special events, the River Center at Saluda Shoals Park and the Meech House at Mungo Park offer elegant, versatile spaces. Over the past year, ICRC hosted *6,775 facility rentals*, generating approximately *\$900,000 in operating revenue* for the agency.

## Partnerships

By combining the potential of both the public and private sectors, partnerships enhance our ability to deliver on goals, strengthen ties to a more livable community, and maximize often limited resources.

ICRC's signature annual event, *Holiday Lights on the River*, was held from November 27 through December 31. This beloved tradition drew *more than 98,800 attendees*, many of whom return year after year to make it part of their family celebration.

The event not only serves as a vital source of operational funding for Saluda Shoals Park, but also contributed an estimated *\$3 million* to the local economy.



# SALUDA SHOALS FOUNDATION



Since 1997, the Saluda Shoals Foundation has been instrumental in supporting the development and sustainability of Saluda Shoals Park. As a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization, the Foundation is committed to preserving the park's natural environment and enhancing its programs through advocacy and financial support. Each year, the community responds with generosity through the Foundation's annual campaign and special fundraising events.

In FY 2024–2025, the Foundation raised *more than \$274,000* through a combination of individual giving, corporate support, events, and grants. Highlights include:

- *Over \$81,000* in contributions from individuals and businesses.
- The Shuckin' on the Shoals Oyster Roast fundraiser, raised *more than \$32,000* through sponsorships, ticket sales, and raffles.
- Two grants totaling \$20,000 from Dominion Energy—awarded in Fall 2024 and Spring 2025—supported the addition of two new Challenge Course elements and funded repairs to the boardwalk in the Wetland Preserve.
- A *\$10,000* grant from the CW and Dorothy G. Love Foundation to support the development of public art projects at Saluda Shoals Park.
- A *\$30,000* donation from the Leo's Pride Foundation to fund the expansion and enhancement of Therapeutic Recreation facilities at Seven Oaks Park.
- A *\$5,000* donation from University of South Carolina Football player Nick Emmanwori to support the Afternoon Safari program.

The continued generosity of the community and corporate partners ensures that Saluda Shoals Park remains a vibrant, inclusive, and sustainable space for all.

Generous donor gifts also supported park programs and events including the following:

- An evening at Holiday Lights on the River for more than 200 Fort Jackson soldiers.
- Park programs and events including Backyard Saturday, Holiday Lights on the River, Egg-Cessible Egg Hunt, Pickin' & Piggin' BBQ Cookoff, Jazz Series, and the Special Olympics Tennis team.

## Public Art

The Saluda Shoals Foundation Public Art Committee has made significant progress on the reinstallation of *Subjects*, a series of suspended fish sculptures by artist Mike Williams. The committee selected a new, prominent location for the artwork and collaborated with a landscape architect to create an innovative display design. The project has gone out to bid, with construction and installation anticipated to be completed in 2025.

The *Rock Angels* sculptures by artist Greg Fitzpatrick, found a new home at the redesigned entrance of Mungo Park. Thanks to the support of the Mungo Foundation, the artwork was integrated into the park's new landscaping, enhancing the visitor experience and celebrating the connection between art and nature.

## Environmental Education Center Renovation

Originally built in 2001, the Environmental Education Center at Saluda Shoals Park has long served as a hub for education and community programs. As the Park's vision

continues to evolve, the facility now requires significant upgrades to meet future needs.

To revitalize this key resource, the Irmo Chapin Recreation Commission (ICRC) and the Saluda Shoals Foundation are undertaking a phased renovation, with phase one set to begin in January 2026. Improvements will include an expanded outdoor deck for programs and events, and new ADA-accessible restrooms to better serve visitors.

In support of this effort, the Saluda Shoals Foundation is preparing a capital campaign to raise funds for phases two and three, ensuring the Environmental Center becomes a vibrant Welcome Center along the Saluda Shoals Riverwalk.
